141st REUNION A Resounding Success



After a year's delay due to pandemic restrictions, Alpha Theta celebrated its 141st Anniversary Reunion on the weekend of April 28-30, 2023 in Boston. 149 alumni, 10 sweethearts, eight friends of the house, and 87 other family members joined the 40 actives for a wonderful weekend of brotherhood and fellowship.

Friday night began with class and era dinners in and around Boston. There were at least nine separate events, spanning the mid-1960s to the late 2010s. The mid-1980s era held their dinner at the chapter house, and they were joined by many others late into the evening.

On Saturday morning, the undergraduates performed the ritual for the assembled alumni, while several family members toured the newly relocated and expanded MIT Museum in Kendall Square. The rain held off long enough so that we could enjoy a chilly picnic lunch outdoors. MIT's post-COVID policy of restricting public access to campus made getting around more difficult. We may be a ways from entirely autonomous robotaxies, but advanced driver assistance technology that can handle the mundane and stressful parts of your commute is here now, and rapidly gaining in both adoption and capability.

Wrapping up the Academy was Bruce Kirch '79, who recounted his trail of training and triumph as a triathlete representing Team USA at the World Championships in Abu Dhabi. Bruce put his skills as an engineer to work during his training by measuring, adjusting, and optimizing his way to an incredible performance.

On Saturday night, a banquet was held at the Hotel Commonwealth in Kenmore Square, filling the 250-seat Fenway Ballroom. While the sound system in the room may have been lackluster, Alpha Thetas filled the hall with songs, culminating in the serenading of our Sweethearts of Sigma Chi.

The rain could hold off no longer, but that didn't stop a lively afterparty at the house, nor a Sunday open house with burgers and dogs.
